Last year was filled with exciting change and growth for ACPA. Perhaps the most important occasion in 2022 was the return to meeting in person at ACPA's 79th Annual Meeting in Fort Worth, Texas.

Our community depends on ACPA's highly valued education, and we delivered it to nearly 1,000 providers through in-person and virtual programming.

Our organization has made initial progress in several areas of ACPA's 2022-2025 strategic plan. *The Cleft Palate Craniofacial Journal* reached its highest-ever impact factor. Hybrid Annual Meeting

ACPA's first hybrid Annual Meeting was held in Fort Worth, Texas ensuring our members had access to the latest research and education to best care for their patients whether in-person or virtually.

New Committees

The ACPA Board of Directors voted to create the ACPA Advocacy, ACPA DEI, and ACPA Family Resources Committees, embarking on critical initiatives that directly impact the professional lives of our members and the patients they serve.

Increased College Scholarship Award Amounts

ACPA awards three college scholarships annually to outstanding students born with cleft and craniofacial conditions making college more affordable for their families. Many times, these students are inspired by their own journeys to pursue a career in the cleft and craniofacial field.

In 2022 we increased the award amounts ranging from \$5,000 to \$10,000 to make an even bigger impact.

Launched Team Care Coordinator Retreat

A virtual event was offered to care coordinators to learn and share knowledge between care teams. The event was attended by 147 professionals, and was free to members.

New ACPA Brand

HONORS AWARD, RANDALL/LAROSSA COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIP Most people know that a child born with a cleft lip and palate undergoes surgery to repair the birth defect, but they are unaware of the complications with speaking, eating, breathing, and hearing that take an entire childhood to correct. Dealing with selfconfidence issues at a very young age stemming from bullying and name-calling, I decided that I would determine my own identity rather than just being the kid with a facial difference.

Every life achievement became my voice to say being born with that difference doesn't make me different at all. Even as my self-reliance grew, I learned to appreciate that someone looked beyond my scars and befriended me simply because of my worth as a human being.

I have never forgotten the children I left behind in China. My early life experience motivated me to partner with the non-profit organization Love Without Boundaries. To date, I have been able to sponsor the cleft repair surgeries of seven children living in under-resourced communities in China and Cambodia.

It has been difficult to forget the stares of others and the feelings of insecurity I once had. The many doctor appointments, therapy sessions, and surgeries, however, made me a stronger person. The positive aspects of having a cleft include finding a close-knit community, making true friends, becoming closer with my family, and gaining confidence to be proud of my appearance. I am grateful and honored to have been chosen for this year's General College Scholarship.

I will be attending Salve Regina University in Newport, Rhode Island to obtain my nursing degree and fulfill my mission of helping children like me.

I hope to become a cleft nurse specialist and work on a cleft team. By awarding me this scholarship, you have reduced my financial burden, which will allow me to focus on my class work and not worry so much about how I am going to pay for school. Thank you very much for your generosity!

Being born with a cleft lip and palate has come with many challenges. Although I have had multiple surgeries over the years, I have to learn how to deal with the lasting effects of cleft lip and palate. I hope to become a role model for other kids that are going through the same things I went through.

I was lucky to have gone to Shriners Hospital in Chicago for most of my surgeries and I have met other kids like me over the years which has helped me feel like I'm not the only one born like this. I'm the first born in my family with a cleft lip and palate so there's been a lot of learning over the years. My family has always been very supportive flying back and forth to Chicago for doctors' appointments and other local doctors.

Getting this scholarship will help me achieve my dreams of becoming a linesman at Pratt Community College.

Becoming a linesman, I can give back to my community when the power gets knocked out. I like working with my hands building and working on my truck. I'm currently building a dune buggy and hope to work on future projects. Thank you for helping to better my future.
